## Use Less, Pay Less

Regardless of what energy source you use to heat your home, the less you use, the less you pay. And as winter rolls in and temperatures drop, The Energy Co-op—because we are a nonprofit cooperative that works for its members—wants you to use less energy, not more. So, take a minute to read through our tips on saving energy dollars and conserving energy during the winter from our blog posts earlier this year and in 2018.

And for those Energy Co-op members who participate in our RNG program, your commitment to a more sustainable energy future is never more dear than during the cold weather months. Not surprisingly, those who use gas to heat their homes incur the vast majority of their annual expense over the winter months. So, in addition to energy conservation, you might want to consider another way to reduce your winter gas bills further by signing up for budget billing with your gas utility, either <a href="PECO">PECO</a> or <a href="PECO">PGW</a>. Utility budget billing programs let you spread the additional cost of higher-use months over the entire year, so you get more stability in your monthly energy bill costs.

These programs may or may not suit every member's needs. PECO, for example, requires those signing up for budget billing to do so for both RNG and electricity. Still, for some Energy Co-op members, these programs might be an effective way to better manage their household budgets while investing in our sustainable energy future.

Despite the pandemic, The Energy Co-op has sponsored and presented a record number of events this year, mostly on Zoom, of course. We started the year—back when we could—meeting a few dozen members in-person at lunches and dinners. We presented at lifelong learning programs hosted in Wynnewood and at Temple University. Then, we celebrated Earth Month in April with Zoom webinars co-hosted by Clean Air Council, Weavers Way, and Philadelphia Energy Authority. We started hosting RNG webinars every month last spring and, later in the year, participated in panels hosted by the University of Pennsylvania and, again, Clean Air Council, before conducting two Member Ambassador training sessions in October and November.

And speaking of local, Philadelphia Energy Authority (PEA) is partnering with a financial institution on the Affordable Multifamily Housing Program to provide several lending products as well as tailored guidance and resources for prospective partners. PEA and its partner offer assistance and financing solutions to help streamline the process of executing energy upgrades on affordable multifamily housing units. Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf's executive order, issued in October 2019, will lead to the Commonwealth joining the <u>Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative</u>, or RGGI (sounds like "Reggie"). The public comment period on the proposed regulations implementing the order is now open. RGGI is a CO<sub>2</sub> budget trading program in which ten northeastern states participate. As we noted in <u>our blog post</u> earlier this year, RGGI is designed to slow the effects of climate change by cutting carbon emissions and driving investment in clean energy.
